## **HISTORY**

The history of the College of Menominee Nation is a recent chapter in the long story of the Menominee People.

The tribe's narrative spans thousands of years. Its land once encompassed a vast hunting, gathering and agricultural range from east of Lake Michigan to west of the Mississippi River. By the 20th Century, tribal land was reduced to a reservation of 235,000 acres. By mid-Century, Federal efforts to terminate the standing of the Menominee as a recognized tribe had dismantled a functioning economy and community infrastructure that included schools, courts, industry and health care on the reservation.

Through Federal courts, the Menominee successfully won restoration of tribal status in 1973 and began rebuilding their financially and culturally devastated community. As part of that rebuilding, Menominee leaders asked Dr. Verna Fowler, a member of the tribe, to create a College on the reservation to serve the community and strengthen its infrastructure. Founding President Fowler served from 1992 to 2016.

The College of Menominee Nation began offering classes in January 1993 in borrowed and rented facilities with 42 students enrolled in general education



courses. CMN was chartered on March 4, 1993, and in 1994 began classes on its current site in the town of Keshena. At the request of the neighboring Oneida Nation, CMN began offering a small number of professional development courses nearby in the city of Green Bay metropolitan area.

Today, CMN is an accredited Land Grant Institution offering four Bachelor's Degrees, a variety of Associate Degrees, and several technical diplomas. The flagship campus in Keshena has nine major buildings and serves two-thirds of CMN's enrollment. Students who comprise the remaining one-third attend classes in a leased building 45-miles east in the metro Green Bay area. Both campuses welcome students from many American Indian tribes and a broad range of ethnicities and races.

## **LEADERSHIP**

Board-level oversight as stipulated in the College Charter is provided by seven Trustees. Those serving on the Board are all enrolled members of the Menominee Tribe.

Leadership of CMN is vested in the College's President. Dr. Paul F. Trebian assumed the presidency in May 2018 following a national search by the Board.



His academic credentials and professional experience include higher education, business administration, and information technology.

Dr. Trebian is a long-time resident of Wisconsin and an enrolled member of the Tlingit Tribe of Alaska.

*American Indian alumni of the College account for 69 percent of all graduates and represent approximately 36 recognized Tribes and Bands. Menominee and Oneida Nation people constitute the majority of alumni (55 percent). Other Woodland Indian Tribes and Bands represented among CMN graduates include Stockbridge-Munsee, Chippewa, Ho-Chunk, Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwa, and Potawatomi. Graduates from more distant tribal communities include Apache, Choctaw, Comanche, Hopi, Kiowa, LaJolla, Navajo, Salt River Pima Maricopa, Shoshone, Sioux, Sisseton-Wahpeton, Tohono O'odham, Ute, and Winnebago.*


